ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Catherine R. Gira - President

Dr. Catherine R. Gira became the President of Frostburg State University on September 1, 1991. Prior to that, she served for nine years as Provost at the University of Baltimore. She also previously held the positions of Professor of English and Acting Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at that institution.

Dr. Gira has held leadership positions in numerous national and state professional associations, including the American Association of University Administrators (President, 1988-90); Federation of State Humanities Councils (Vice-Chair, 1993-94; National Secretary, 1991-93; member of the Board of Directors, 1991-94); Commission on Higher Education (Middle States Association Commissioner, 1994-present; member of the Executive Committee, 1997-present); American Council on Education Leadership Commission (1994-1996); Maryland Humanities Council (Chair, 1989-91; member, 1983-95) and the Maryland Association of Higher Education (President, 1986-87). She sits on several regional and national boards, including those of the Western Maryland Health System, the Rocky Gap Foundation, the Regional Education Service Agency, the Cumberland Theatre and the National Joint Military Intelligence College.

Dr. Gira earned a B.S. from California State College (Pa.), an M.Ed. and a master's in Liberal Arts from The Johns Hopkins University and a Ph.D. in Literature from the American University. She has been recognized as Woman of the Year by the Maryland Legislature (1993) and as one of Maryland's Top 100 Women (1996), and she was inducted into the Maryland women's Hall of Fame in 1997. She has also been formally honored for her role in regional economic development by the regional Tourism Association Board and by local media.



Roger Bruszewski - Vice President for Administration and Finance

Entering his 19th year with Frostburg State University is Roger Bruszewski, who has served as Vice President for Administration and Finance since 1995. Bruszewski is the chief financial officer and chief operating officer of the University and oversees a wide variety of the campus operations. In addition to his interactions with faculty, staff, students and alumni, he also serves as a liaison with numerous organizations including the Board of Regents, University System of Maryland Administration, corporate interest and local, state and federal agencies.

After joining Frostburg State as director of computing services in 1988, Bruszewski became Associate Vice President of Administrative and Computing Services one year later, a position he held until 1994 when he assumed the role of Vice President for Finance and Planning.

Prior to coming to FSU, Bruszewski served as chairman and associate professor of the business and commerce division at Daemen College in New York from 1984-88. During his tenure as the administrator for the accounting, business administration, business education, transportation and travel and public administration departments, enrollment increased 33 percent (reaching an all-time high), the accounting program received accreditation by the New York Board of Accountancy and successful fund raising efforts yielded a computer training facility for the transportation and travel program.

Additionally, Bruszewski served eight years at College Misericordia in Dallas, Pa., as chairman and assistant professor of the business department (1977-81) and director of administrative and computing services (1981-84). He also coached women's basketball (1978-80) and softball (1978-81) while at College Misericordia.

Bruszewski is a 1974 graduate of Plattsburgh State University of New York with a bachelor's in business administration. He earned his master's in business administration with a concentration in management from Youngstown State University in 1977 and holds an A.B.D. in educational administration and policy from the State University of New York at Buffalo.



Ralph Brewer - Director of Athletics

Ralph L. Brewer was named Frostburg State's athletic director on July 1, 2003 after serving on an interim basis since August 2, 2000. Bobcat athletics have thrived under Brewer's direction. The number of corporate sponsors has increased, student-athlete retention rates and academics have improved and facilities have been upgraded, most notably with the construction of new soccer and softball fields, the installation of new scoreboards, message boards and a sound system in Bobcat Arena and the addition of \$90,000 of new equipment in the weight rooms.

Brewer is no stranger to Frostburg State, having been a member of the FSU English Department from 1969 to 2001. He served as chair of the department from XX-XX and continued to teach several classes during his first year as athletic director. A strong supporter of Bobcat athletics, he has been chair of the Athletic Advisory Committee and served as the university's faculty representative for both the NCAA and Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference steering committees. He was also a member of search committees for the head football coach and sports information director positions and served as President of the Atlantic Central Football Conference.

Brewer graduated from Austin Peay State College in Clarksville, Tenn., in 1967 with a bachelor's degree in English and taught at Clarksville High School from 1967-68. He then earned his master's degree in English from Austin Peay in 1969 before joining the FSU staff.

He has served on numerous English department and University committees and task groups, including the President's Cabinet, the Senate Steering Committee and the Strategic Planning Task Group. Additionally, he was President of the Faculty Assembly (1980-81) and Chair of the Faculty Senate (1992-94).

HEAD COACH RUBIN STEVENSON



Sixth Season

21-28 Overall

12-8 ACFC

Salisbury State '87

Rubin Stevenson enters his sixth season as head coach of the Frostburg State University football program and 13th overall as a member of the Bobcat coaching staff. Stevenson has led the Red and Black to a 21-28 overall record, a 12-8 mark in the Atlantic Central Football Conference, two ACFC championships (2002 and 2003) and a berth in the 2002 Eastern College Athletic Conference Southwest Championship Game.

Stevenson, who became the 11th head coach in the history of the program August 2, 2000, traditionally takes his Bobcats up against one of the toughest schedules in Division III.

Last season, Frostburg State struggled to a 2-8 overall record and a 1-4 mark in an expanded ACFC. The Bobcats added five new coaches to the staff, were struck by a nagging injury to All-ECAC running back Mike Kitchen early in the year as well as a season-ending injury to All-American defensive end Kevin Culbert just three games into the year and were again challenged with a schedule that featured three NCAA Playoff squads from the previous season.

The Bobcats did post two shutout victories for the first time since 1997, ranked third in the ACFC in scoring defense, total defense and passing defense and had nine players named to the All-ACFC squad.

In 2003, Stevenson led FSU to a 4-5 overall record and a 3-0 mark in the ACFC. The Bobcats dropped three games to teams that earned berths in the NCAA playoffs, lost another by seven points in overtime and another by just two points. FSU closed out its year with a thrilling 15-14 win over rival Salisbury, Stevenson's alma mater, to capture its third ACFC title as well as its fourth Regents Cup crown, awarded annually to the winner of the FSU-Salisbury contest.

The Bobcats garnered a host of post-season honors as 17 players were named to the All-ACFC squad. Stevenson was voted ACFC Co-Coach of the Year, senior quarterback Grant Burrough was selected the ACFC Offensive Player of

the Year and junior defensive end Kevin Culbert was chosen ACFC Co-Defensive Player of the Year.

Senior tight end Roy Olson was named to the College Sports Information Directors All-America honorable mention team and also played for Team USA against Mexico in the annual Aztec Bowl, while Culbert was named to the College Sports Information Directors All-America honorable mention team as well as the *Don Hansen's Football Gazette* All-America third team.

Additionally, 15 FSU players were named to the ACFC All-Academic Team.

In 2002, Stevenson guided the Bobcats to a 6-5 overall finish, the ACFC title with a perfect 3-0 record and a berth in the Eastern College Athletic Conference Southwest Championship game.

The Bobcats pounded Salisbury, 37-7, to win the Fourth Annual Regents Cup Game, and Stevenson was named the ACFC Coach of the Year. Eighteen FSU players earned All-ACFC honors, five were named to the *Don Hansen's Football Gazette* All-South Region squad, two (defensive lineman George O'Brien and tight end Roy Olson) were voted to the Hewlett Packard All-America team and one (Olson) was selected to the American Football Coaches Association All-America squad.

In 2001, Stevenson's squad posted a 5-4 finish, including a 2-1 mark in the ACFC. FSU began the year with a 25-23 upset of Division I-AA Marist and closed out the season with a three-game winning streak, including an exciting 30-27 overtime victory against Salisbury in the Regents Cup Game at RFK Stadium. Fourteen Bobcats were selected to the All-ACFC squad, including O'Brien, who was named the league's Defensive Player of the Year. O'Brien was also voted to the Hewlett-Packard All-America third team as well as the *Don Hansen's Football Gazette* All-South Region third team.

In 2000, his first season as head coach, Stevenson guided the Bobcats to a 4-6 overall record and a 3-3 mark in the ACFC. Thirteen FSU players were named to the All-ACFC squad, including a league-high five to the first-team defense, while 14 earned ACFC All-Academic Team honors.

Stevenson has served as FSU's defensive coordinator since his arrival in 1992 and has consistently molded the Bobcat defense into one of the nation's top units.

In his first year with the program, the Bobcats finished ninth in the nation in pass efficiency and 17th in points allowed. His 1995 unit ranked fourth in the country in pass efficiency, and his 1996 squad finished second in pass efficiency, fourth in total defense and seventh in scoring defense.

In 1998, the Bobcats were ranked nationally in passing defense (21st), total defense (37th) and rushing defense (37th). His 1999 unit was 40th in the country in pass defense efficiency (94.8 rating), registering 18 interceptions and allowing just 12 touchdown passes in 11 games.

In 2000, the Bobcats ranked 13th in the nation in pass defense efficiency (82.8 rating), holding opponents to 44.8 percent passing and six touchdowns while recording 17 interceptions. The FSU defense allowed just 126.7 passing yards and 17.0 points per game.

FSU also led the ACFC in sacks three straight years, recording 28 in 2000, 26 in 2001 and 36 in 2002.

Stevenson handled numerous responsibilities during his tenure as an assistant. In addition to his role as defensive coordinator, he served as FSU's special teams coach from 1992 to 1999 and was named the assistant head coach in 1997.

He has also coached the secondary, defensive line and inside linebacker positions. His reputation as a top defensive mind earned him a coaching internship with the Washington Redskins for their 1999 training camp held at FSU.

Stevenson has also served as director of compliance for the FSU athletic department since 1994. His responsibilities include monitoring the academic status and eligibility of all

student-athletes as well as interpreting NCAA rules and regulations.

Stevenson values not only producing quality players but also quality people.

"One of the things I am most proud of is helping students become productive citizens once they graduate. I believe in building character, and my goal is for each student-athlete to become a better person over the course of his college career."

Before arriving in Frostburg, Stevenson served as an assistant coach at Central Connecticut State University under Mike McGlinchey from 1987-1992 and earned his master's degree in educational administration and supervision from CCSU in May 1991.

Stevenson also played for McGlinchey at Salisbury, enjoying a standout career at linebacker and helping the Sea Gulls reach the 1986 NCAA Division III National Championship game.

Stevenson, who earned his bachelor's degree in social work from Salisbury in 1987, is married to the former Patti Spencer. The two are proud parents of twins Faith and Grace, born May 7, 2004.

ASSISTANT COACHES



Mike Silecchia **Offensive Coordinator/ Offensive Line** **Mansfield '78**

Mike Silecchia enters his second season as the offensive coordinator at Frostburg State University and owns 24 years of college coaching experience.

Last season under Silecchia's guidance, offensive lineman Jared Toler earned first-team All-Atlantic Central Football Conference honors, while wide receivers Adam J.

Snyder and Gil Bolden were second-team selections.

Silecchia came to Frostburg after serving as the head coach at Lebanon Valley College for six years. He coached 31 All-Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) selections as well as numerous MAC All-Academic Team honorees during his tenure. In 2003, tight end Scott Marek became the first Dutchman to earn first-team All-America honors in the program's history.

Prior to becoming the head coach at Lebanon Valley, Silecchia served as the offensive line coach at MAC powerhouse Lycoming College from 1995 to 1998. He helped the Warriors advance to the NCAA Division III national quarterfinals in 1995, the national semifinals in 1996 and the national championship game in 1997. Lycoming also won two MAC Championships and registered two undefeated league seasons during Silecchia's stay.

Silecchia began his collegiate coaching career at Mansfield University, where he served as an assistant from 1978-1982. He then moved to the high school ranks as head coach at Athens (1982) and North Penn (1983-1985) before returning to Mansfield as the defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator from 1985 to 1995.

Silecchia graduated from Mansfield in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in general studies and also earned his master's degree in special education from Mansfield in 1984.

He and his wife, Sherry, have three sons, Nick (33), Donald (25) and Ben (24).



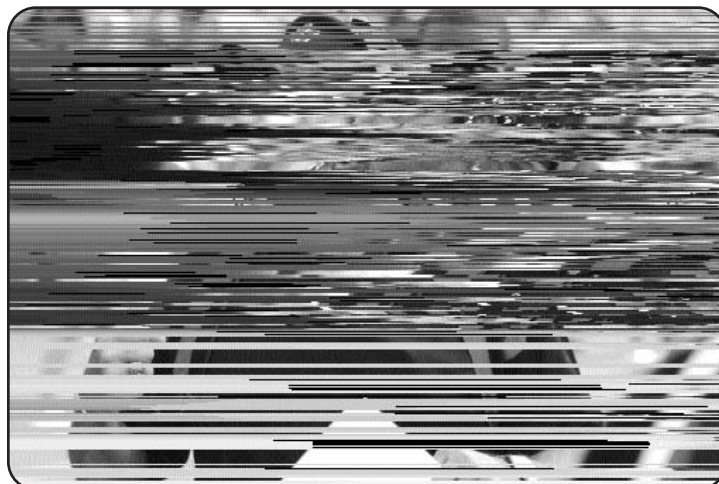
Mike Boni **Linebackers** **Ohio '04**

Mike Boni begins his second season as a graduate assistant coach at Frostburg State and will again work with the linebackers. Boni came to Frostburg State from Ohio University, where he served as a student assistant for the 2003-04 academic year.

Boni served as an NFL Europe Football Operations Intern in the NFL Office in New York from July 2002 to

January 2003. He organized and distributed the 2003 NFL Pro Bowl ballot, handled scouting reports for NFL Europe coaches and tracked prospect videos and biographies for the 2003 NFL Europe Draft.

Boni, who earned his degree in sports sciences with a minor in business administration from Ohio in June 2004, hails from Moon Township, Pa., and was a member of the Moon Area High School state runner-up football team in 1998. He is pursuing his master's degree in business administration at Frostburg State.



Jeremy Cheshire **Running Backs/Strength** **Shepherd '02**

Jeremy Cheshire begins his second season as a graduate assistant coach at Frostburg State and will work with the running backs after serving as the offensive line coach for the 2004 season. He also assists with running the team's strength and conditioning program.

Cheshire joined the Bobcat staff after serving as an assistant at Division II Shepherd (W.Va.) University for one year. He worked with the offensive line and special teams and was also an assistant strength and conditioning coach.

Cheshire played center at Potomac State College from 1997 to 1999 before transferring to Shepherd. He was a center and guard for the Rams in 2000 and 2001 and then joined the coaching staff as a student assistant.

Cheshire earned an associate's degree in political science from Potomac State in 2000 and completed his bachelor's degree in political science and history from Shepherd in 2002.

A 1997 graduate of Keyser (W.Va.) High School, Cheshire is a member of the United State Marine Corps Reserve. He is pursuing his master's degree in counseling at Frostburg State.



Tom Gorman **Kickers/Punters/Strength** **Frostburg State '84**

Tom Gorman enters his sixth season as a Bobcat assistant and will again coach the kickers and punters. He is also FSU's certified strength and conditioning coach and works with many other Bobcat teams as well.

FSU has boasted one of the top kicking games in the Atlantic Central Football Conference during Gorman's tenure.

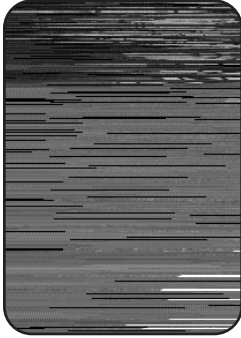
In 2003, kicker Nick Quisgard was named to the All-ACFC first team after hitting 7-of-9 field goals and 10-of-11 extra points.

In 2002, the Bobcats boasted the ACFC's top punter and ranked 41st in the nation in net yards per punt (32.41).

In 2001, Gorman molded a pair of freshmen into the top kicking tandem in the league. Quisgard was a first-team All-ACFC selection as a punter, leading the conference with a 36.8-yard average, and he shared first-team All-ACFC honors as a placekicker after connecting on 4-of-6 field goals and 12-of-17 extra points. Jarred Boehner was also solid, hitting 12-of-16 extra points and averaging 35.4 yards per punt.

Gorman, who played for FSU from 1981-84, coached at Stranghan High School in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., for two years (1987-88). He also served as a graduate assistant coach at Northern Michigan University for the 1989 season.

ASSISTANT COACHES



DeNelle Hale **Running Backs** **Frostburg State '05**

DeNelle Hale enters his third season as an assistant coach after enjoying an outstanding playing career with the Bobcats from 1998-2001. After seeing limited action as a freshman, Hale had a breakout sophomore season, carrying 209 times for 957 yards and scoring eight touchdowns.

Injuries limited him to just 56 carries for 136 yards and one touchdown in his junior year, but he returned to health as a senior and capped his career in style, earning first-team All-Atlantic Central Football Conference and honorable mention All-Eastern College Athletic Conference honors by rushing for 1,073 yards and scoring 15 touchdowns (13 rushing, two receiving). He also earned first-team All-ACFC honors as a punt returner after leading the league with a 12.6-yard average.

Hale topped the ACFC in all-purpose yards (168.8 ypg) and set school and conference records with five rushing touchdowns and 30 points in a 44-13 win over Apprentice. He played in the National All-Star Football Game in Minneapolis, Minn., and caught three passes for 30 yards to help the Red Team defeat the Blue Team, 24-0.

Hale was also a four-year letterwinner with the FSU basketball team and averaged 3.2 points, 1.4 rebounds and 1.4 assists. The Bobcats posted a combined 57-54 overall record, including a 20-10 mark in 2000-01. FSU won the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference Tournament championship and finished as the runner-up in the ECAC Southern Region Tournament.

Hale, who owns the distinction of being the only athlete in FSU history to win conference crowns in both football (1999) and basketball (2001) during his career, earned his bachelor's degree in economics in May 2005. He is also scheduled to complete a degree in accounting in December 2005.

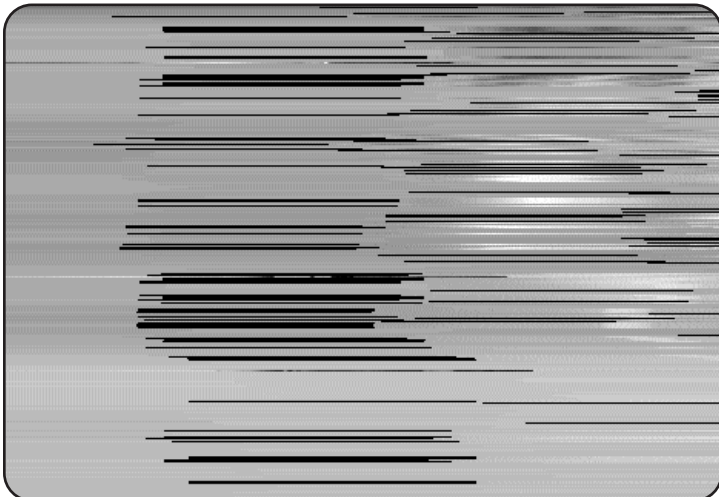


Billy Jackson **Quarterbacks/Wide Receivers** **Frostburg State '03**

Billy Jackson begins his second season as a full-time assistant coach at Frostburg State and will work with the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Jackson, who was a student assistant coach for the 2003 season, enjoyed a solid playing career with the Bobcats from 1996 to 2000. After red-shirting due to injury as a freshman, Jackson went on to appear in 28 games and completed 85-of-202 passes for 937 yards and seven touchdowns. He also ran for 494 yards and four more scores.

Jackson earned his bachelor's degree in liberal studies from Frostburg State in 2003.



Trevor Zeiders **Defensive Line** **West Virginia '01**

Trevor Zeiders begins his second season as Frostburg State's defensive line coach. Zeiders came to FSU from Gettysburg College, where he served as the defensive line coach for three years. He was also the junior varsity defensive coordinator for the 2003 season and recruited Pennsylvania, Virginia and Frederick County, Maryland.

As a student-athlete at West Virginia University, Zeiders was an inside linebacker and long snapper before becoming a student assistant coach for Don Nehlen for the 1999 and 2000 seasons. He assisted with the inside linebackers, long snappers, punters and kickers and was on staff in WVU's 49-38 win over Mississippi in the 2000 Music City Bowl. Zeiders graduated from WVU in 2001 with degrees in both sports management and athletic coaching education.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Zeiders was a four-year letterwinner and three-year starter on the offensive and defensive lines at West Perry High School. Also a team captain, he earned numerous high school honors, including first-team all-conference accolades and the West Perry High School Booster Club Player of the Year award.

In addition to football, he was the starting heavyweight on the wrestling team.



Bobcats Look to Rebound Behind Experienced Defensive Unit

After a disappointing 2-8 season a year ago, the Frostburg State football team has almost nowhere to go but up in 2005. With 13 returning starters, including eight on defense, sixth-year Head Coach Rubin Stevenson and the Bobcats will look to rebound and challenge for their fourth Atlantic Central Football Conference title in the league's six-year history.

The FSU defense, boosted by the return of senior All-American defensive end **Kevin Culbert (Purcellville, Va./Loudoun Valley)**, should be the strength of the team this fall. Culbert, who as a junior earned several All-America honors after making 80 tackles, including 22 for loss and 10 sacks, was a pre-season All-America selection by three organizations last year. However, his season came to a quick end thanks to a hand injury he suffered against SUNY Brockport in the third game.

Culbert was on pace for another stellar season with 32 tackles, including 10.5 for loss and 3.0 sacks, before the injury. He earned ACFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after making 14 tackles, including 5.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks, in the season-opener against Apprentice.

Senior nose tackle **Justin Bressler (Hollywood, Md./Leonardtown)** and junior defensive end **Ryan Cutsail (Middletown, Md./Middletown)** will join Culbert to give the Bobcats one of the most experienced lines in the conference.

Bressler played in all 10 games last year, starting eight, and made 28 tackles. Cutsail has started all but one of his 19 collegiate games and is a two-time All-ACFC pick. Last year, he made 49 tackles, including a career-high 10 against Salisbury in the season finale.

The defensive front will have great depth with sophomores **Gabe Ellis (Laurel, Del./Delmar)**, **Kyle Steele (Fallston, Md./North Harford)** and **Ryan Burns (Mt. Airy, Md./South Carroll)**. Ellis, who started the final seven contests in place of Culbert, earned second-team All-ACFC honors after posting 51 tackles and 3.5 sacks. Steele and

Burns saw valuable playing time and combined for four tackles on the year.

The linebacker unit took a major hit with the losses of James Clash (graduation) and Mo Fokou (transferred to the University of Maryland), so Stevenson will look to senior **Chris Lentz (Ashburn, Va./Broad Run)** to lead the way from his inside spot.

Lentz, who has started each of FSU's 30 games in his career, earned All-ACFC honorable mention honors last year after leading the Bobcats with a career-high 90 tackles, including 8.5 for loss and 3.5 sacks. He posted a season-high 14 stops against Maryville to earn ACFC Defensive Player of the Week honors and had 13 tackles versus both Buffalo State and Wesley.

Junior **Lathon Romaine (Chantilly, Va./Lake Braddock)**, who started five games and made 27 tackles last season, and junior **Scott MacGregor (Ijamsville,**

Md./Urbana), who did not play last year after making 45 stops in seven contests in 2003, will compete for the other inside position.

Junior **Dan Nice (Mount Joy, Pa./Hempfield)** is the frontrunner to fill Fokou's outside spot and is pound-for-pound one of the strongest players on the team. Last season, he played in eight games and made 13 tackles.

Coaches will look to senior **Mike Davis (Chesapeake City, Md./Bohemia Manor)** to step up in place of Clash. Davis made 10 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, in limited action and was instrumental on special teams.

Redshirt freshman **Brandon Wheelbarger (South Riding, Va./Broad Run)**, who missed last season with an injury, and promising freshman **Kevin Glascock (Welcome, Md./Lackey)** will also add quality depth to the linebacker corps.

Senior safety **Jon Menz (Sykesville, Md./Glenelg)** and junior cornerback **Vincent Thomas (Upper Marlboro, Md./C.H. Flowers)** return to lead the defensive backfield after starting every game last season.

Menz posted 52 tackles and paced the Bobcats with three interceptions. His best performance came against Waynesburg when he had a career-high 11 tackles to go along two pass breakups and an interception. Thomas made 20 tackles and added four pass breakups and an interception a year ago.

Sophomore **Johan Owens (Baltimore, Md./City College)** is the frontrunner for the other corner position after gaining valuable experience last year. In five games, he had eight tackles, one interception, one pass breakup and one forced fumble.

The other safety spot will be a battle among several candidates. Sophomore **Najier Frazier (Bowie, Md./Duval)** made 20 tackles in nine contests last year, sophomore **Palestine Croswell (Germantown, Md./Northwest)** had three stops in five games and sophomore **Jim Robertson (Sussex, N.J./High Point)** had eight tackles in six appearances. Junior **Steve Skipper (Oakland, Md./Southern Garrett)** and sophomore **Derek Schrader (Meyersdale, Pa./Meyersdale)** will also challenge for time.

Many questions surround the offense, which averaged just 12.7 points and 255.5 yards per game in 2004. Offensive coordinator Mike Silecchia joined the coaching staff just a week before the start of preseason camp, and the Bobcats simply needed time to adjust to new terminologies and philosophies.

Improved play over the final three games of the year as well as a strong spring practice season have given FSU reason for high expectations in 2005.

The front line should be strong with the return of four starters, but the Bobcats will have to adjust to the graduation of left tackle Jared Toler, a four-year starter and three-time first-team All-ACFC pick. Junior **Frank Boka, Jr. (Leonardtown, Md./Leonardtown)** will move from his guard spot to fill the void. Boka has started 14 games over the last two seasons and has excellent footwork for his size (6-5, 340).

Senior **Dave Kenderdine (Westlawn, Pa./Wilson)** moves into the left guard spot after starting there the final two games of 2004, while junior **Pete Wilson (Street, Md./North Harford)** returns at right tackle, where he has started each of the last 19 contests.

Senior **Jack Hopkins (Mt. Airy, Md./Linganore)** will anchor the line from the center spot, where he has six career starts. He is pound-for-pound one of the strongest players on the team and was the regular the final two games of last season.

The right guard position will be a battle between junior **Glenn Jones (Campbell Hall, N.Y./Goshen Central)**, junior **Bennett Carroll (Towson, Md./Towson)** and sophomore **John Valcour (Sterling, Va./Park View)**. Several promising freshman should add depth along the entire line.

The quarterback position will be another contest in preseason camp, with junior lefthander **Jimmy Ward (Poolesville, Md./Poolesville)** having the advantage of experience as he started all 10 games last year. He completed 140-of-283 passes for 1,544 yards but threw just 10 touchdown passes and was picked off 14 times. He will look to build upon his final three contests of 2004, during which he threw for 584 yards and five scores.

Ward will be challenged by sophomores **Andre Dixon (Upper Marlboro, Md./Roosevelt)** and **Josh Hager (Baltimore, Md./Eastern Tech)**, who both showed promise towards the end of last season. Dixon has excellent running skills and can handle the option very well, while Hager is a proven winner from his high school career.

Freshman **Kevin Wolpert (Columbia, Pa./Hempfield)**, a transfer from Millersville, and freshman **Branden Giffin (Rawlings, Md./Fort Hill)** will also compete for time.

Several players will battle at running back for the right to replace Mike Kitchen, the team's leading rusher each of the last two seasons.

Junior **Antoine Lewis (Baltimore, Md./City College)** is the top returner, having gained 31 yards on 13 attempts last year. He showed flashes on special teams, where he returned 13 kickoffs for 213 yards.

Sophomore **Jimmy Meetre (Mt. Airy, Md./South Carroll)** was limited to just two games due to injury in 2004 but is a strong and physical player who was impressive in last year's preseason camp. Talented sophomore **Shanorm Young (Baltimore, Md./Poly)** was moved from linebacker to running back in the spring and should push for time as well.

The fullback spot will be another heated competition in camp. Sophomore **Mike Pelozzo (Sayre, Pa./Athens)**, a transfer from Virginia Tech, is the likely frontrunner after a strong spring.

The Bobcats suffered another key loss at wide receiver with the graduation of Adam J. Snyder, and a handful of young players will be looked at to step up and replace his production and leadership.

Junior **Fred Howze (Upper Marlboro, Md./From The Heart Catholic)** started all 10 games last season and caught 24 passes for 287 yards (12.0 average) and one touchdown, while classmate **T.J. Changuris (Frederick, Md./Seneca Valley)** had 13 receptions for 106 yards.

Juniors **Bobby Alkire (Lonaconing, Md./Westmar)** and **Mike Gray (Baltimore, Md./City College)** and sophomores

Dan Duncan (Lonaconing, Md./Westmar) and **Damian Shorter (Waldorf, Md./Lackey)** will all look to make an impact. Duncan saw time on the junior varsity last season, while Alkire (quarterback), Gray (defensive back) and Shorter (quarterback) are making the switch from another position.

The tight end spot will be open to competition with 11 candidates. The options are plenty, but none of the players are proven.

With so much to decide on offense, special teams play could be key to FSU's success this season. Senior **Chris Martin (Cumberland, Md./Fort Hill)**, who converted 3-of-6 extra point attempts and 1-of-2 field goal tries last year, and redshirt freshman **Tom Vanik (Baltimore, Md./Catonsville)**, a transfer from Millersville who had a good showing in the spring, will compete for the punting and placekicking duties.

Young, junior **Dorsey Walker (Temple Hills, Md./Oxon Hill)** and freshman **Desmond Wars (New Windsor, Md./Westminster)** will battle at the kickoff and punt return positions.

The Bobcats will have to find answers to all of their questions quickly if they hope to have success against another difficult schedule. Four of FSU's first five games are against ACFC foes, with the lone non-conference contest in that stretch the home-opener versus perennial regional power Montclair State.

FSU could face stiff challenges from schedule newcomers Thomas More (away) and Seton Hill (Homecoming), and a road game at Westminster is followed by the home finale against Waynesburg. The Bobcats then close out the regular season with their annual showdown against defending conference champion Salisbury in the Regents Cup Game.

"Our schedule is demanding as always, and our run through the first five games will answer a lot of questions," said Stevenson. "We must focus on competing in every game if we want to be successful this year."

THE REGENTS CUP

The long-time battle between in-state foes Frostburg State and Salisbury has always been intense, but the series has featured added incentive with the advent of the Regents Cup Game. Beginning in 1999, the Bobcats and Sea Gulls began competing for the award given by the University System of Maryland Board of Regents to the winner of the only football game that features two USM member institutions.

The Regents Cup is held the last Saturday of the regular season, and members of the USM Board of Regents present to the winning coach and team captains the trophy which the victors display on their campus until the following year's game. The winning team also claims the title "Champion of Football in Maryland," which is engraved on the Cup along with each year's game score.

Frostburg State and Salisbury have faced each other every season since 1973, and the teams' status as Maryland's only public, football-playing schools on the Division III level since the late 1970s has only raised the intensity of the rivalry. Salisbury dominated the series in the 1980s, winning seven straight contests (1982-88). Five of those victories came under the direction of head coach Mike McGlinchey, who guided the Sea Gulls to three NCAA Playoff appearances from 1982-86. After leaving Salisbury to coach Central Connecticut State, McGlinchey returned to Maryland and assumed the head coaching position at Frostburg State in 1992. McGlinchey guided the Bobcats to a 3-1 record against the Sea Gulls and led FSU to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Playoffs in 1993.

The last five meetings have featured another twist, with Salisbury Head Coach Sherman Wood and Frostburg State Head Coach Rubin Stevenson guiding their respective teams. The two were teammates — and roommates — at Salisbury in 1982-83 and helped the Sea Gulls reach the 1983 NCAA Division III national semifinals.

Fittingly, the all-time series is tied 16-16. Salisbury dominated the early years, winning 13 of the first 16 meetings. The Bobcats turned the tables beginning in 1989 and have claimed 13 of the last 16 contests.



REGENTS CUP HISTORY

Frostburg State 23, Salisbury 22 • November 13, 1999 • PSINet Stadium • Baltimore, Md.

In the inaugural meeting for the coveted Regents Cup Trophy, Sea Gull kicker Paul Jacko's 41-yard field goal attempt sailed wide left as time expired as Frostburg State held on for the exciting victory. The Bobcats, who clinched the first official ACFC championship with the win, trailed, 22-15, with 3:56 to play before senior Jason Henry connected with senior Greg Cooper on a 47-yard scoring strike to pull FSU to within one with 2:43 left. Senior Craig Hopkins followed with a two-point conversion run to provide the winning margin.

Salisbury 18, Frostburg State 8 • November 11, 2000 • RFK Stadium • Washington, D.C.

Salisbury evened the Regents Cup series behind a ground attack that racked up 243 of the team's 336 total yards. Freshman Mac Mollet ran for 86 yards and a touchdown and also completed 9-of-12 passes for 93 yards. Paul Jacko sandwiched field goals of 21 and 22 yards around a Reggie Boyce 14-yard touchdown run as the Sea Gulls built an 18-0 lead through three quarters. Frostburg State got on the board in the final stanza, as Andrew Dinbokowitz caught a 23-yard scoring pass from Billy Jackson and John McElhenny tackled Mollet in the end zone for a safety.

Frostburg State 30, Salisbury 27 (OT) • November 10, 2001 • RFK Stadium • Washington, D.C.

For the second time in three years, the Regents Cup title was decided on the game's final play, as junior Tim Wilkins hauled in a 13-yard touchdown pass from sophomore Grant Burrough in overtime to lift Frostburg State to a thrilling. Salisbury forced the extra session on a Tony Ellis three-yard touchdown run with 2:36 to play and used a 23-yard field goal from Paul Jacko on the first possession of overtime to take a 27-24 lead. On FSU's ensuing attempt, Burrough lobbed a fade pass to Wilkins in the right corner of the end zone to lift the Bobcats to another exciting victory. FSU senior DeNelle Hale ran for a game-high 115 yards and a touchdown, while Burrough threw for 179 yards and ran for 83 more, including a 46-yard score.

Frostburg State 37, Salisbury 7 • November 16, 2002 • Towson Stadium • Towson, Md.

Frostburg State converted five Salisbury miscues into 35 points as the Bobcats trounced the 14th-ranked Sea Gulls to win their second straight Regents Cup title and third in the four-year history of the contest. FSU also captured its second ACFC crown in four years.

Frostburg State, which evened the all-time series with Salisbury at 15 by winning for the 12th time in the last 14 meetings, opened an early 14-0 lead in the first quarter thanks to a pair of Sea Gull miscues on special teams and tacked on a safety and another touchdown to take a 23-0 lead at halftime. The Bobcats kept pouring it on in the second half. Junior Andy Wilson blocked a punt and returned it for another score, and sophomore James Clash added a 31-yard interception return for a touchdown to close out the dominating performance.

FSU shut down the Sea Gulls, who entered the game ranked No. 3 in the nation at 351.9 rushing yards per game, to the tune of just 78 yards on 54 carries.

Frostburg State 15, Salisbury 14 • November 15, 2003 • Johnny Unitas Stadium • Towson, Md.

Senior Grant Burrough tossed an eight-yard touchdown pass to senior Roy Olson with 10:33 left, and Frostburg State stopped Salisbury on a fourth-and-four play from the Bobcat 36 with 55 seconds remaining to claim a thrilling 15-14 victory. Frostburg State, which won the Regents Cup for the fourth time in the game's five years, finished its season 4-5 and captured the ACFC title for the second year in a row.

The Bobcats opened the scoring in the first quarter on a 27-yard field goal by junior Nick Quisgard, and junior Mike Kitchen added a two-yard scoring run in the second to give FSU a 9-0 lead (the extra point was no good). Senior Rishawd Watson put Salisbury on the board with a 10-yard touchdown run to pull the Sea Gulls to within 9-7 at the break.

Watson ran in from five yards out with two seconds left in the third to give the Sea Gulls a 14-9 advantage, but the Bobcats moved back in front for good on a 13-play, 72-yard drive. Burrough hit sophomore Gil Bolden for a 21-yard gain on fourth-and-11 from the SU 27-yard line and then found Olson two plays later for the go-ahead score. The two-point pass failed. The Sea Gulls had one final chance when Burrough fumbled at the FSU 42 with 2:14 left. However, Bobcat sophomore Josh Morris broke up a pass on fourth-and-four at the 36 with 55 seconds left to seal the victory.

Junior defensive end Kevin Culbert earned FSU's Mike McGlinchey Most Valuable Player honor after making nine tackles, including eight solos, five for loss and a sack. Junior linebacker Brad DeHaven took home Salisbury's MVP honors with 15 stops, including two for loss.

Salisbury 23, Frostburg State 7 • November 13, 2004 • Johnny Unitas Stadium • Towson, Md.

Junior quarterback Dustin Johnson ran for 83 yards and a touchdown and completed 7-of-11 passes for 79 yards and a score to lead No. 5 Salisbury to a 23-7 victory over Frostburg State in the Sixth Annual Regents Cup Game. Johnson won the Mike McGlinchey Most Valuable Player Award for the Sea Gulls, who improved to 10-0 overall and captured their first ACFC title with a 5-0 mark. Freshman Antoine Beale ran 20 times for 135 yards and caught six passes for 60 yards and a touchdown to earn the McGlinchey Award for the Bobcats, who finished the season 2-8 overall and 1-4 in the ACFC.

Salisbury scored on its first two possessions and never looked back. Junior Leroy Satchell capped an opening 61-yard drive with a six-yard rumble and Johnson later hit sophomore Teddy Savage with a 30-yard scoring pass to give the Sea Gulls a 14-0 lead. Johnson raced 25 yards for another score with 1:35 left in the second to increase SU's lead to 20-0 at the break.

Sea Gull junior Brock Boland booted a 48-yard field goal midway through the third to cap SU's scoring. Beale caught a 16-yard pass from sophomore Jimmy Ward with 11:13 left to account for FSU's lone score.

ACFC History

The Atlantic Central Football Conference, a football-only league competing among the NCAA Division III ranks within the South Region, was formed in the fall of 1997 and began play officially in 1998. The league's inaugural membership included six previous football independents: Chowan College and Methodist College in North Carolina, Frostburg State University and Salisbury University in Maryland, Wesley College in Delaware and Ferrum College in Virginia. Greensboro College in North Carolina joined the ACFC in 1999.

No official champion was crowned in 1998 due to scheduling difficulties, and, in 1999, Frostburg State claimed the first official ACFC title with a 5-1 league mark and finished 8-3 overall. In 2000, Wesley captured the league title on the final weekend of the regular season with a thrilling 27-24 victory over Ferrum. The win propelled the Wolverines into the NCAA Division III National Playoffs.

Prior to the 2001 season, Chowan, Ferrum, Greensboro and Methodist moved to the Dixie Conference and Newport News Apprentice joined the ACFC. Wesley captured its second straight conference crown in 2001 with a perfect 3-0 league record.

The 2002 season saw all four teams finish .500 or better, with Frostburg State claiming its second ACFC title with a 3-0 mark. The Bobcats posted a 6-5 overall record and advanced to the ECAC Southwest Championship, where they dropped a hard-fought 24-21 contest to Johns Hopkins. Salisbury, which was second in the league at 2-1, finished the regular season 9-1 overall and earned an at-large berth to the NCAA playoffs where it fell to King's 28-0.

Frostburg State repeated its undefeated run through the conference in 2003, claiming its second straight crown and third in five years with a 3-0 league mark en route to a 4-5 overall finish. Salisbury started the year with seven straight victories and finished second in the league at 2-1 and 7-2 overall.

Expansion hit the ACFC in 2004 as two schools from New York — Buffalo State College and SUNY Brockport — joined the league. The ACFC crown stayed in the state of Maryland but shifted to the Eastern Shore as Salisbury ran through the league with a perfect 5-0 mark and went on to finish the regular season 10-0. The Sea Gulls earned another berth in the NCAA playoffs where they dropped a 35-24 decision to Christopher Newport in the opening round. Wesley was second in the league with a 4-1 mark and finished 8-2 overall.

Sophomore Jimmy Ward completed 10-of-19 passes for 193 yards and two touchdowns in his first start in two years to lead Frostburg State to a season-opening 14-0 win over Apprentice at Bobcat Stadium.

Ward, who started one game and completed 1-of-4 passes for three yards as a true freshman in 2002 before red-shirting in 2003, had a rough start to the day, fumbling the ball away at his own 48 on just the third play from scrimmage. Ward atoned for the miscue on FSU's next possession when he tossed a short pass to junior Gil Bolden, who crossed the middle of the field and outraced several defenders down the near sideline for a 74-yard touchdown.

Frostburg State, which won its fourth straight season opener, took a 14-0 lead with 5:04 left in the second on another catch-and-run. On first down from the Apprentice 45, Ward tossed a 10-yard pass to senior Adam J. Snyder, who spun out of a tackle and sprinted down the Bobcat sideline for another score.

Apprentice (1-1) looked to get on the board on its next possession when freshman Charles McQuerry found fellow freshman Travis Reid for an apparent 65-yard touchdown strike. However, a holding penalty negated the score and FSU took its 14-0 lead into halftime.

FSU senior Turon Kendrick snared two interceptions in the second half to thwart a pair Apprentice drives, and the Builders' final chance to score ended in more frustration as FSU came up with stops on third-and-three and fourth-and-one runs inside the Bobcat 30.

Bolden finished with three catches for a career-high 94 yards and a touchdown. Senior All-American defensive end Kevin Culbert led the Bobcats with 14 tackles, including 5.5 for loss and 1.5 sacks, while junior Chris Lentz added 12 tackles. Freshman Mo Fokou finished with 10 tackles in his collegiate debut.

Senior Mike Passero threw three touchdown passes and sophomore Vin Doffont kicked three field goals as 10th-ranked Montclair State downed Frostburg State 29-14 at Sprague Field.

Senior cornerback Shawn Murray had two interceptions and senior lineman Darnell Webster recorded two sacks in helping MSU improve to 4-0 all-time against the Bobcats. Freshman Antoine Beale rushed for 74 yards and both Frostburg State touchdowns in his first career start.

Montclair State (2-0) opened the scoring on a 37-field goal by Doffont on the first drive of the game, but the Bobcats (1-1) answered right back, as Beale capped a 10-play, 70-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown run to make the score 7-3. The Red Hawks answered on their first play back on offense when Passero connected with Steve Armstrong for a 74-yard touchdown.

Doffont's second 37-yard field goal extended the lead to 12-7 with 9:08 left in the first half, and the Red Hawks made it 19-7 as Passero hit Eric Ferriol with an 11-yard toss with just under six minutes left before halftime.

Frostburg State cut into the lead in the third with a 13-play, 64-yard drive that was aided by a roughing the kicker penalty. The Bobcats also converted on fourth down inside the MSU 20, setting up Beale's second touchdown, a one-yard plunge with 2:11 left in the quarter.

Murray intercepted sophomore Jimmy Ward at the FSU 19 and the Red Hawks capitalized as Armstrong pulled in a five-yard pass from Passero to put Montclair State up 26-14 with 12:55 to play. Doffont capped MSU's scoring with a 29-yard field goal with 5:35 to play. Armstrong finished with seven catches for 123 yards, while Passero completed 9-of-20 for 153 yards.

Ward went 11-of-24 for 95 yards while junior Gil Bolden had four catches for 45 yards.

Senior Bob Darnley completed 15-of-28 passes for 251 yards and two touchdowns and the SUNY Brockport defense held Frostburg State to 56 total yards in the second half as the Golden Eagles handed the Bobcats a 24-10 loss in ACFC action at Bobcat Stadium.

Brockport improved to 3-1 overall and 2-1 in the ACFC, while Frostburg State had its nine-game league winning streak snapped and fell to 1-2 overall and 1-1 in the league.

FSU came out firing on its first possession, moving from its own 20 to the Brockport eight before settling for Chris Martin's 35-yard field goal. The Golden Eagles took the lead for good on junior Jon Brown's four-yard touchdown run with 10:33 left in the second half and opened a 14-3 cushion when Darnley hit a leaping Kevin Beaumont in the back of the end zone with 2:46 remaining in the half.

Quarterback Mike Mikolaichik ran for two touchdowns to lead Buffalo State past visiting Frostburg State 16-9 in an ACFC contest at muddy Coyer Field. The Bengals improved to 1-4 overall and 1-1 in the ACFC, while the Bobcats fell to 1-3 overall and 1-2 in the league.

Frostburg State got off to a rough start as Carl Jean-Louis intercepted a pass by sophomore Jimmy Ward on the Bobcats' third play from scrimmage. Buffalo State needed just five plays to go 23 yards, capped off by a nine-yard Mikolaichik run and an Eric Buchanan extra point to give the Bengals their first lead of the season at 7-0.

Wesley scored 16 points in the third quarter to break open a tight battle en route to a 22-0 victory over Frostburg State in ACFC action at Bobcat Stadium. FSU was shut out for the first time since a 9-0 loss at Apprentice October 29, 1988, a span of 162 games.

The Pioneers scored 20 unanswered points in the third quarter thanks to the arm of Lomas. He hit senior Clayton Devine with a five-yard scoring pass, found freshman Elliott White with a three-yard toss and connected with junior Jeff Chick on a 31-yard score to give Widener a commanding 40-7 lead.

FSU put together a solid eight-play, 61-yard scoring march capped by Kitchen's one-yard plunge early in the fourth, but the two-point conversion was stopped and the Bobcats trailed 40-13. Widener pushed its lead to 47-13 on a 22-yard pass from Lomas to Chick with 9:21 left before FSU followed suit, using its passing game to spark a 65-yard scoring march that ended with a five-yard strike from Ward to Howze with 6:23 to play. The Pioneers capped the scoring with another big play, as freshman backup quarterback Matt Campbell hooked up with Schmidt for a 70-yard scoring pass with 4:41 remaining.

Kitchen ran 34 times for a game-high 121 yards and his first two scores of the season. His 34 carries were three shy of both his career high mark and the Quick Stadium record. Ward finished 13-of-22 for 147 yards and a touchdown.

Senior Mike Kitchen ran 35 times for 142 yards and a touchdown, and Frostburg State held Maryville to just 150 total yards in a 22-0 shutout before a Homecoming crowd of 2,000 at Bobcat Stadium. Frostburg State snapped a five-game losing skid and improved to 2-5 overall, while Maryville had its three-game winning streak come to an end and fell to 3-4.

Kitchen, who was just two attempts shy of tying his career-high of 37 carries set against Westminster last year, scored on a nine-yard touchdown run that capped an 11-play, 74-yard drive to open the game. Kitchen carried seven times for 49 yards on the march.

The Bobcats continued to move the ball well on their next two possessions but came away empty. They turned the ball over on downs at the Maryville 13 late in the first quarter and missed a 36-yard field goal early in the second and settled for a 7-0 lead at the break.

After forcing a three-and-out to start the second half, the Bobcats went back to their ground game, rushing 10 times in an impressive 11-play, 84-yard scoring march. Maryville threatened on its ensuing possession, moving from its 37 to the FSU 15, but could not convert a fourth-and-long play in the opening seconds of the fourth quarter and turned the ball over on downs. FSU gained some breathing room midway through the final stanza when sophomore Lathon Romaine and freshman Taylor Davis tackled Scot quarterback Kevin McKeethan in the end zone for a safety. Following the free kick, Ward tossed a short pass along the near sideline to junior Gil Bolden, who maneuvered through several defenders and raced into the end zone for a 44-yard touchdown to complete the scoring. Ward finished 11-of-16 for 152 yards and a touchdown.

Junior Chris Lentz had a season-high 14 tackles for the Bobcats.

Senior Scott Froelich ran for 181 yards and accounted for all four Westminster touchdowns as the visiting Titans dropped Frostburg State 25-13 at Bobcat Stadium. Froelich ran for two touchdowns, threw a touchdown pass to senior quarterback Joe Getsy also and caught a scoring pass from Getsy to help Westminster improve to 8-1-1 all-time against Frostburg State.

Froelich put Westminster (4-4) on the board with a 19-yard touchdown run with 6:03 left in the opening quarter before Bobcat sophomore Jimmy Ward hit senior Adam J. Snyder with a three-yard touchdown pass. However, the extra point attempt was wide left and the Bobcats trailed 7-6 at the end of the first quarter.

FSU (2-6) took its only lead of the day on an unconventional play with 4:33 left in the half. Ward connected with junior Gil Bolden on a short pass, and while being wrapped up by several Titan defenders, Bolden handed the ball off to Snyder, who raced 25 yards untouched into the end zone. Senior Nick Quisgard nailed the extra point to give FSU a 13-7 lead.

Westminster needed just five plays to move back in front as Froelich turned a short screen pass from Getsy into a 19-yard touchdown along the far sideline. The extra point attempt hit the right post and the game was tied at 13 at the break.

In the third, Froelich took a handoff from Getsy, rolled to his left and lobbed a pass across the field to Getsy, who sprinted 25 yards into the end zone. Froelich then capped the scoring when he broke through the line and raced 61 yards for a touchdown with 4:44 remaining. Frostburg State turned the ball over on downs near midfield on its last two possessions, and Westminster ran out the final seconds to seal the win.

Bobcat senior Mike Kitchen ran 30 times for 133 yards, his third straight 100-yard rushing performance. Ward finished 13-of-35 for 139 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions, while Snyder caught three passes for 50 yards and two scores.

Senior Jeff Dumm tossed a touchdown pass and ran for another score to lead Waynesburg to a 30-19 win over Frostburg State at John F. Wiley Stadium. The Yellow Jackets improved to 6-3 with their 12th straight home victory, while the Bobcats fell to 2-7.

Both teams booted 32-yard field goals on their initial possessions before Dumm hit Ivan Hawkins with a 10-yard scoring pass to push the hosts back in front. Luke Cunkelman increased Waynesburg's lead to 17-3 when he intercepted a pass by sophomore Jimmy Ward and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown with 6:31 left in the opening half. Ward later atoned for the miscue by connecting with senior Adam J. Snyder for a 28-yard scoring pass on Frostburg State's next possession.

Dumm led the Yellow Jackets down the field in the closing minutes of the half and capped a seven-play, 66-yard drive with a one-yard plunge with just 13 seconds remaining to give Waynesburg a 24-9 lead at the break.

Frostburg State took the second-half kickoff and marched to the Yellow Jacket five before settling for a 22-yard field goal by Quisgard which made it a 24-12 contest. The Bobcats then cut their deficit to 24-19 when Ward and Snyder teamed up for another 28-yard scoring pass with just four seconds remaining in the third quarter, but Eric Daniels sealed the victory for Waynesburg when he dashed 28 yards into the endzone with 1:40 left.

Freshman Antoine Beale ran for a career-high 115 yards on 24 attempts, Ward finished 16-of-35 for a career-high 241 yards and Snyder grabbed eight passes for a career-best 121 yards to help the Bobcats amass a season-high 379 yards of offense. Junior Jon Menz led the Frostburg State defense with a career-high 11 tackles, including nine solo stops and one tackle for loss. He also broke up two passes and intercepted another.

The Bobcats held the Yellow Jackets to 326 total yards, well below their 442.0-yard average that ranked 24th in the nation entering the day.

Salisbury extended its lead to 14-0 on its next possession when Johnson hit sophomore Teddy Savage with a 30-yard scoring pass and built a 20-0 cushion when Johnson raced in from 25 yards out with 1:35 remaining in the half.

Boland kicked a 48-yard field goal with 8:09 remaining in the third quarter to extend Salisbury's lead to 23-0, and Beale caught a 16-yard touchdown pass from Ward with 11:13 left to cap the scoring.

The Sea Gulls outgained the Bobcats 336-281, including 257-77 on the ground, in snapping a three-game losing skid to their cross-state rivals.

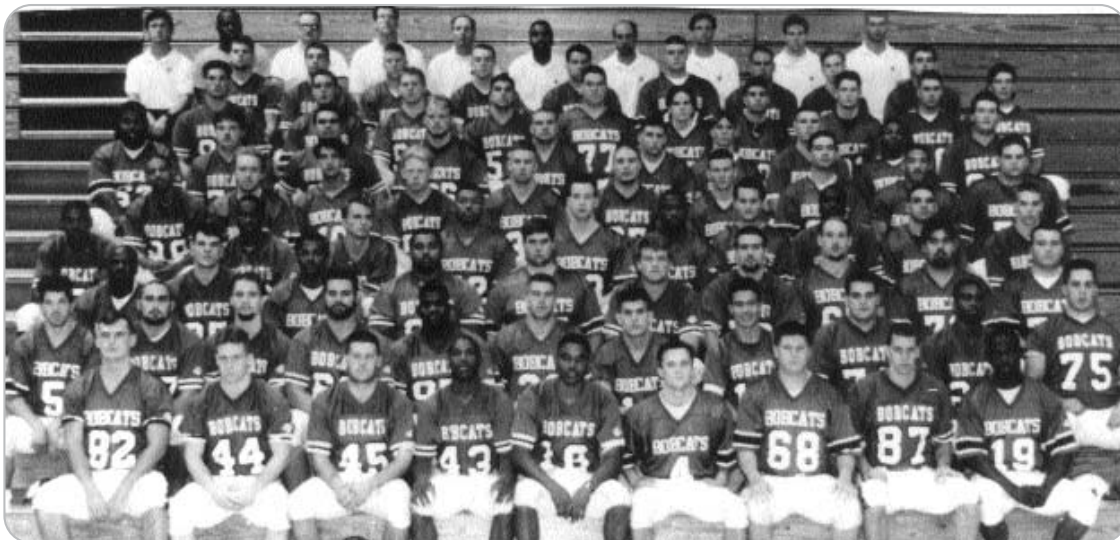

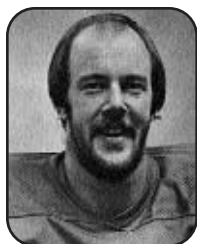

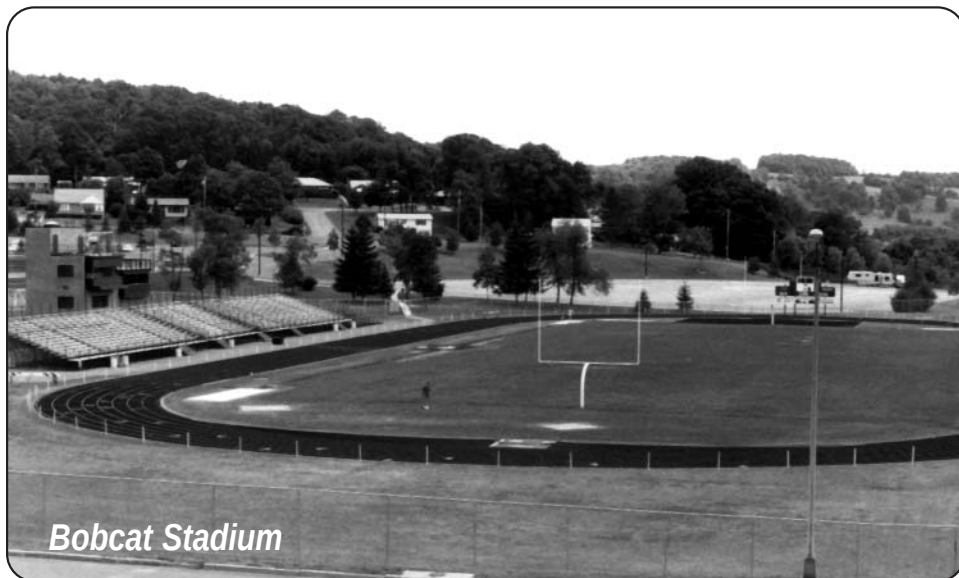

WHERE THEY PLAY

The Frostburg State football team plays its home games at Bobcat Stadium, a 4,000-seat, natural grass facility located on the south end of campus. The Bobcats have played four post-season contests at Bobcat Stadium, including a 1993 NCAA quarterfinal game against Washington & Jefferson (W&J won 28-7). FSU owns an 85-65 (.567) all-time record at Bobcat Stadium.

WHERE THEY TRAIN

The Frostburg State University weight rooms located in the Harold J. Cordts Physical Education Center underwent a major renovation in February 2005. Nearly \$90,000 of new equipment was added, selected older equipment was be removed and other existing equipment was repositioned.

New strength equipment (pictured to the right) featured power racks, Olympic oak platforms with Bobcat logo, adjustable benches and adjustable pulley stations. New cardio equipment included four treadmills, four steppers and two bikes.

ABOUT FROSTBURG STATE UNIVERSITY

From an opening day enrollment of 57 students, Frostburg State University has grown to a present day enrollment of over 5,000 students. Its physical plant, once limited to a single building, Old Main, which housed classrooms and a library, has also grown to over 30 facilities including classroom buildings, residence halls, the Lewis J. Ort Library, the Harold J. Cordts Physical Education Center, the Lane Center, and the Performing Arts Center, situated on 255 beautiful acres.

Opened in 1902 as State Normal School No. 2, the University owes its existence to the tenacity of J. Benson Oder, editor of the Frostburg Mining Journal, and the citizens of Frostburg who, in spite of political barriers, raised funds and purchased the site on which the University is located.

Principal Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh and three faculty instructed the first Normal School class; in addition, the other faculty taught 151 children in the Model School. The Normal School students, who were high school students having to meet no requirements other than age (girls, 16; boys, 17), had but one two-year course of study, elementary education. The curriculum consisted of Latin, mathematics, history, rhetoric and literature, natural and physical sciences, drawing, music, calisthenics, psychology, philosophy of education, philosophy of school management, Pedagogy, Observation, Practice Work and Primary Manual Training.

Over the years, the name of the institution has reflected the changes in the scope of its educational mission. In 1935, the State Normal School No. 2 became the State Teachers College at Frostburg, a four-year college which offered a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education. In 1963, the name became Frostburg State College, and finally in 1987, with the strong support of the local civic and business community, became Frostburg State University, an indication of its growing resources, diversity and excellence in educational opportunities for the region and the state.

In 1988, FSU became a constituent institution of the University System of Maryland, comprised of 11 of the state's 13 public institutions. Expanding to meet the educational needs of the region, the FSU Center in Hagerstown was also established in 1988 to offer upper-level bachelor's degree coursework and graduate programs. The University also opened, in 1990, a permanent location for the Frederick MBA program.

Throughout its growth, the University has emphasized excellence in teaching. Over 80% of the full-time faculty hold Ph.D.s or terminal degrees from institutions that are among the most prestigious in the nation. Faculty scholarship has led to scholarly books, manuals and journals, as well as numerous articles and reviews. This excellence in faculty has resulted in superior results for students. FSU has been ranked first among its peers for the number of doctorates per 100 baccalaureate degrees awarded. In the same study, FSU was ranked second in the percentage of national, prestigious awards received by faculty. These have included Fulbrights and significant grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the National Endowment for the Arts and other national associations.

At the same time, the University has developed comparable excellence in academic programs, research, consulting, cultural and athletic events, and facilities. In recent years the campus has consistently received a superior rating, the highest state award given for facilities and maintenance. In addition, FSU was also recently ranked safest college campus in the state.

Today, the University's mission and services have expanded significantly. Over 400 full-time administrators and support staff, and more than 200 full-time faculty serve the educational needs of students who come not only from throughout the United States, but also the world. These students have a choice of 37 major programs of study leading to the Bachelor of Art, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Fine Arts and Bachelor of Technical and Professional Studies degrees as well as graduate degrees in applied ecology and conservation biology, business administration, counseling psychology, education, wildlife/fisheries biology, human performance, modern humanities, park and recreation resource management, teaching and applied computer science. In addition, 12 pre-professional programs are offered.

Frostburg State University continues its pursuit of excellence. It is a tradition which now spans over a century.

- Students from FSU's Society for the Advancement of Management chapter placed third nationally in case competition.
- FSU education graduates have typically had pass rates of 96%-98% on the National Teachers Exam.

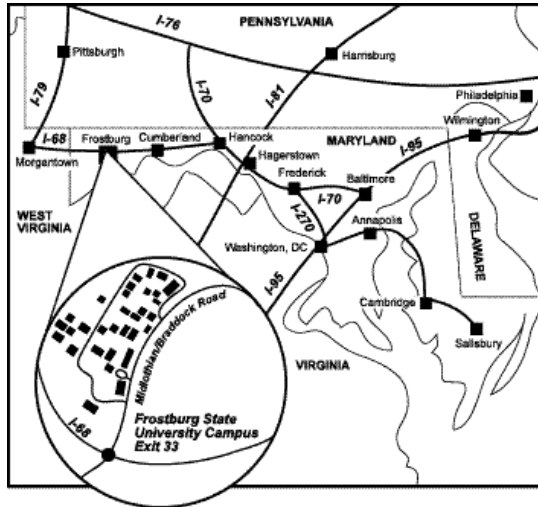

From Pittsburgh, Pa. and Points North

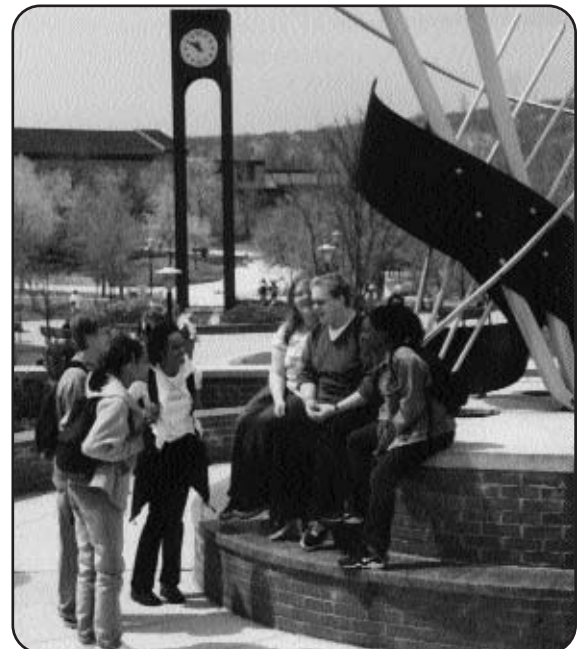

Take I-270 North towards Frederick, Md. At Frederick, take I-70 West to I-68 at Hancock, Md. Proceed to exit 33 (second Frostburg exit). Bear right onto Midlothian Road and proceed about one mile to the main entrance to the campus on the left.

Frostburg State University is located in the Appalachian highlands (elevation 2,200 feet) of Western Maryland. The main campus covers 260 acres within the town limits of Frostburg (population 7,300). The University also offers courses in Frederick, Maryland and at the Center in Hagerstown, Maryland.

The local region is rich in both history and outdoor activities. Students can visit nearby recreational areas — Rocky Gap, New Germany and Deep Creek Lake State Parks — which offer camping, boating, swimming, hiking and skiing.
