## Brian Parker Head Coach

Brian Parker begins his fourth season as head coach of the Frostburg State University women's soccer program. The 1992 FSU graduate is the winningest Bobcat women's soccer coach with a 40-16-7 record in his three seasons. FSU has won

the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament in all three of his years at the helm.

Last season, Parker earned his second consecutive AMCC Coach of the Year award after guiding the Bobcats to a 14-3-3 overall record (the .775 winning percentage is the best in program history) and an 8-1 mark in the AMCC. FSU hosted the AMCC Tournament for the second straight year, blanking Pitt-Greensburg 2-0 in the semifinals before edging Penn State Behrend 3-2 in double overtime to win the title.

For the second consecutive year, the Bobcats squared off with Westminster in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, where the teams battled through two overtimes before the Bobcats pulled out the win with a 5-3 victory in penalty kicks. The Bobcats then dropped a hardfought 2-1 decision to No. 24 Christopher Newport in the second round.

In his second campaign, Parker was named the AMCC Coach of the Year after leading the Bobcats to a 16-5 overall record (the second-most wins in team history behind the 2001 squad's 17-5 mark) and a perfect 6-0 finish in the AMCC (their first undefeated record in the conference's seven-year existence).

The Bobcats, who set a school record with 12 straight wins, captured their first AMCC regular-season title and hosted the conference tournament for the first time as well. FSU defeated Penn State Behrend 4-2 in the final to win its third straight AMCC crown and earned a third consecutive berth in the NCAA Division III Tournament.

The Bobcats were chosen to host an NCAA match for the first time in school history and made the most of the opportunity, defeating Westminster 3-2 for their first NCAA Tournament victory in three tries. FSU turned in another strong performance in the region semifinals but were edged by No. 2 Scranton 1-0.

In his debut season, Parker guided the Bobcats to a 10-8-4 record and the No. 3 seed in the AMCC Tournament. In the semifinals, FSU slipped past No. 3 Pitt-Greensburg 2-1 in overtime and then upset No. 1 La Roche, 3-1 in a shootout, to capture the conference title. The Bobcats earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, where they fell to Westminster 4-1 in the first round.

Prior to returning to western Maryland, Parker served as head girls soccer coach at Urbana High School in Frederick County, Md., since the school's opening in 1995. He guided the Hawks to an impressive 62-36-6 record and a pair of regional championships during his tenure.

In just his second season at Urbana, Parker was named the Frederick County Coach of the Year after leading a team of freshmen and sophomores to the school's first-ever regional championship crown. The Hawks, who posted winning records in six of Parker's seven years, earned their second regional title in 2001.

Parker is no stranger to FSU, as he was a goalkeeper for the Bobcats from 1987-89. He was a member of two Eastern College Athletic Conference Tournament qualifiers, including the 1989 squad that won the ECAC South Region Championship.

Parker then coached the FSU women's soccer team as a club sport from 1990-1992 and received his degree in social sciences with a teaching certification from FSU in 1992. He moved on to West Virginia University where he serve as a graduate assistant for the Mountaineer men's team for two years while earning a master's in political science.

Parker, who has a USSF "B" coaching license as well as an Advanced National Diploma from the NSCAA, is on the Maryland Olympic Development Program Staff and recently led the Maryland 1990 Girls team to the Region I Tournament championship. They will compete for the ODP national championship in Texas in March 2006.

Parker was also a founder and staff coach with the Frederick United Soccer Club (now FC Frederick) until his return to FSU. He and his wife, Karen, a 1993 FSU graduate and native of Frostburg, have two children — Elise (4) and Matthew (2).



## Cara LeMaster Assistant Coach

Cara LeMaster enters her second season as a graduate assistant coach with the Frostburg State women's soccer program.

She joined the Bobcats after enjoying a stellar playing career at Division I Eastern Illinois

University from 1999 to 2002, where she helped the Panthers to a 52-27-3 overall record and an 18-2-1 mark in the Ohio Valley Conference. EIU won three OVC Tournament titles and two OVC regular-season crowns and earned back-to-back berths in the NCAA Tournament in 2001 and 2002.

LeMaster earned numerous honors throughout her playing career. In her collegiate debut season, she garnered OVC Freshman of the Year, first-team All-OVC and Great Lakes Region All-Freshman Team honors, and she repeated on the All-OVC first team as a sophomore.

As a junior, LeMaster was named to the All-OVC second team as well as the OVC All-Tournament Team. As a senior, LeMaster set careerhigh's with nine goals and 25 points and earned first-team All-OVC, OVC All-Tournament Team and third-team All-Great Lakes Region honors for her performance.

LeMaster, who is the first Panther to be named All-OVC four times, currently ranks fourth on the EIU career charts in goals (22), gamewinning goals (6), assists (22) and points (66).

LeMaster recently completed her NSCAA national diploma and is a member of the Maryland DDP coaching staff. A native of Collinsville, Ill., she earned her bachelor's degree in physical education from Eastern Illinois in 2003 and is pursuing her master's degree in education at Frostburg State.



### Sarah Daw Assistant Coach

Sarah Daw joins the Frostburg State women's soccer staff as the team's goalkeeper coach after a standout career at Division II Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

Daw, who has spent the last two summers on the coaching staff of Tony DiCicco's SoccerPlus Goalkeeper Camp, played four years at IUP.

As a senior, she earned first-team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference honors after posting a 0.87 goals against average (the third-lowest mark in school history) and leading the Indians to a 19-4 finish as well as their first PSAC title since 1995. IUP set a school record for wins in a season, earned its first-ever bid to the NCAA Tournament and finished 21st in the final NSCAA/adidas Division II national rankings.

Daw finished her career with a school-record 360 saves, and her 0.95 goals against average ranks second all-time at IUP.

Ďaw, who is from New Freedom, Pa., and Susquehannock High School, earned her bachelor's degree in sports administration and a minor in business from IUP in May. She is pursuing a master's degree in business administration from Frostburg State.

### BOBCATS LOOKING FOR FIFTH STRAIGHT AMCC TITLE, NCAA TOURNEY BID

espite losing seven seniors from last season, including all-time leading scorer Karen Kotofski, Frostburg State's women's soccer team shows no sign of slowing down. The Bobcats hope to make this season their fifth straight as Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference champions. Last season, FSU advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second time in school history, and the team has similar expectations this

"We're going to be fine," said fourth-year head coach Brian Parker. "The lack of depth that we have this year is my only concern."

Division III schools according to soccerratings.com and consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance this season. was ninth in the NSCAA Great Lakes Regional Poll

The top returner this year is junior forward Danielle Carter (Rockville, Md./Rockville). Carter enjoyed a successful sophomore season having finished second on the team with 19 goals and 45 points and earning a slot on the All-AMCC first team. She etched her name in the FSU record books by netting three hat-tricks last season and breaking the single-season school record with seven multigoal scoring games. Carter's speed and footwork will help her get through opponents and take her to the net.

"Carter is going to be even better this year," says Parker. "She is smarter and stronger and can score in a variety of ways."

Vying for time at the forward position will be senior Shera Rowan (Frostburg, Md./Bishop Walsh) and junior Lindsay Hoffman (Frederick, Md./Thomas Johnson).

Rowan will be a significant contributor to the team again in 2005. She saw action in 16 games last year and had four goals and an assist.

Hoffman, who played the last two years at Division I East Tennessee State University, will add speed and energy to the Bobcat roster. At ETSU, she scored three goals and added one assist as a freshman and appeared in 13 games with one start as a sophomore.

"Lindsay will have an immediate impact," said Parker. "We're happy she's decided to continue her playing career here at FSU."

In the midfield position, there is a lot of talent battling to play. Senior Jodie Gittleson (Rockville, Md./Wootton) returns after starting in every game last season. She added 11 goals and 25 points to place third on the team. Gittleson was named to the All-AMCC first team.

Sophomore Jen Naylor (Riva, Md./St. Mary's) started all but one game last season and earned second-team All-AMCC honors after netting three goals and adding an assist. She will contribute significantly to the Bobcat midfield again this year

Also returning to the midfield is senior Micaela Karinshak (Leesburg, Va./Loudoun County). She saw action in 12 games a year ago, scoring two goals and adding three assists.

Sophomore Anita Wickerham (Morgantown, Pa./Twin Valley) moves to the midfield after playing 11 games as a defender last season. She netted a goal and added an assist in her debut season.

Freshman Ali Keeney (Smithsburg, Md./Middletown) will also look to contribute minutes in the midfield.



Seniors Jodie Gittleson, Beth Hlebasko, Shera Rowan, Micaela Karinshak and Teri FSU ended the 2004 season ranked 86th out of 392 Galt look to lead Frostburg State to its fifth straight AMCC title and fifth

Parker will look to seniors Beth Hlebasko (New Market, Md./Linganore) and Teri Galt (Silver Spring, Md./Good Counsel) to again anchor the Bobcat defense. Hlebasko earned first-team All-AMCC honors and Galt earned second teams honors after FSU allowed just 17 goals, posted a league-leading 0.67 goals against average and tied a school record with 10 shutouts.

Hlebasko started every game last year and tied for the team lead with 12 assists while finding the net twice. She enters her final season tied for first on the all-time FSU chart with 26 career assists.

Galt started in 16 of the 19 games in which she appeared a year ago and recorded one assist

Sophomore Sarah Huber (Walkersville, Md./Walkersville) and freshmen Jackie Donovan (Hollidaysburg, Md./Hollidaysburg Area), Tori Walter (Frederick, Md./Frederick), Stephanie Pereira (Montgomery Village, Md./Watkins Mill) and Tricia Richardson (Gibson Island, Md./St. Mary's) add depth and will all be competing to see some time in the backfield.

Sophomore Molly Whyte (Basking Ridge, N.J./Ridge) moves into the starting goalkeeper role after the graduation of Kelly Jones, who went 10-3-2 with a 0.83 goals against average and four shutouts last season. As a freshman, Whyte went 1-0-1 with nine saves and no goals allowed in 110 minutes of action

The Bobcats are once again the preseason favorites to win the AMCC championship according to a vote among the league's coaches. FSU will be challenged by Penn State Behrend and Pitt-Greensburg. who were picked to finish second and third, respectively.

To prepare his squad for another league title defense, Parker has scheduled another tough non-conference slate that includes regional powers Allegheny (Pa.), Carnegie Mellon and Johns Hopkins. Last year, FSU tied both Allegheny (0-0) and Johns Hopkins (2-2) and fell to Carnegie Mellon (2-0).

"This is probably the toughest overall schedule we've played here at FSU," said Parker. "Every stage of the season should prepare you for the next one, so I think we'll be ready in November for another run at the conference title
