Brian Parker Head Coach

Brian Parker begins his fifth season as head coach of the Frostburg State University women's soccer program. The 1992 FSU graduate is the winningest Bobcat women's soccer coach with a 52-22-10 record in his four seasons. FSU has

won the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament in all four of his years at the helm.

Last season, Parker continued his successful run at Frostburg State posting a 12-6-2 overall record and an 8-0-1 slate in the AMCC. For the third-straight year, the Bobcats hosted the AMCC Tournament. FSU shutout La Roche 4-0 in the semifinal round, and later captured the championship defeating Penn State Behrend, 4-3, in a penalty kick shootout. In the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, the Bobcats fell to No. 12 Denison 2-0.

Parker earned his second straight AMCC Coach of the Year award in 2004 after guiding the Bobcals to a 14-3-3 overall record (at .775 the best winning percentage in program history) and an 8-1 mark in the AMCC. FSU hosted the AMCC Tournament for the second consecutive year and blanked Pitt-Greensburg 2-0 in the semifinals before capturing the conference crown with a thrilling 3-2 double-overtime victory over Penn State Behrend.

For the second consecutive year, the Bobcats squared off with Westminster in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament, where the teams battled through two overtimes before the Bobcats pulled out the win with a 5-3 victory in penalty kicks. The Bobcats then dropped a hard-fought 2-1 decision to No. 24 Christopher Newport in the second round.

In his second campaign, Parker was named the AMCC Coach of the Year after leading the Bobcats to a 16-5 overall record (the second-most wins in team history behind the 2001 squad's 17-5 mark) and a perfect 6-0 finish in the AMCC (their first undefeated record in the conference's seven-year existence).

The Bobcats, who set a school record with 12 straight wins, captured their first AMCC regular-season title and hosted the conference tournament for the first time as well. FSU defeated Penn State Behrend 4-2 in the final to win its third straight AMCC crown and earned a third consecutive berth in the NCAA Division III Tournament.

The Bobcats were chosen to host an NCAA match for the first time in school history and made the most of the opportunity, defeating Westminster 3-2 for their first NCAA Tournament victory in three tries. FSU turned in another strong performance in the region semifinals but were edged by No. 2 Scranton 1-0.

In his debut season, Parker guided the Bobcats to a 10-8-4 record and the No. 3 seed in the AMCC Tournament. In the semifinals, FSU slipped past No. 3 Pitt-Greensburg 2-1 in overtime and then upset No. 1 La Roche, 3-1 in a shootout, to capture the conference title. The Bobcats earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, where they fell to Westminster 4-1 in the first round.

Prior to returning to western Maryland, Parker served as head girls soccer coach at Urbana High School in Frederick County, Md., since the school's opening in 1995. He guided the Hawks to an impressive 62-36-6 record and a pair of regional championships during his tenure.

In just his second season at Urbana, Parker was named the Frederick County Coach of the Year after leading a team of freshmen and sophomores to the school's first-ever regional championship crown. The Hawks, who posted winning records in six of Parker's seven years, earned their second regional title in 2001.

Parker is no stranger to FSU, as he was a goalkeeper for the Bobcats from 1987-89. He was a member of two Eastern College Athletic Conference Tournament qualifiers, including the 1989 squad that won the ECAC South Region Championshio.

Parker then coached the FSU women's soccer team as a club sport from 1990-1992 and received his degree in social sciences with a teaching certification from FSU in 1992. He moved on to West Virginia University where he serve as a graduate assistant for the Mountaineer men's team for two years while earning a master's in political science.

Parker, who has a USSF "B" coaching license as well as an

Advanced National Diploma from the NSCAA, is on the Maryland Olympic Development Program Staff and recently led the Maryland 1990 Girls team to the Region I Tournament championship. That team eventually won the ODP National Championship in Texas in March 2006.

Parker was also a founder and staff coach with the Frederick United Soccer Club (now FC Frederick) until his return to FSU. He and his wife, Karen, a 1993 FSU graduate and native of Frostburg, have two children — Elise (5) and Matthew (3).



Cara LeMaster Assistant Coach

Cara LeMaster begins her first season as a fulltime assistant coach after serving the previous two years as a graduate assistant.

She joined the Bobcats after enjoying a stellar playing career at Division I Eastern Illinois

University from 1999 to 2002, where she helped the Panthers to a 52-27-3 overall record and an 18-2-1 mark in the Ohio Valley Conference. EIU won three OVC Tournament titles and two OVC regular-season crowns and earned back-to-back berths in the NCAA Tournament in 2001 and 2002.

LeMaster earned numerous honors throughout her playing career. In her collegiate debut season, she garnered OVC Freshman of the Year, first-team All-OVC and Great Lakes Region All-Freshman Team honors, and she repeated on the All-OVC first team as a sophomore.

As a junior, LeMaster was named to the All-OVC second team as well as the OVC All-Tournament Team. As a senior, LeMaster set careerhigh's with nine goals and 25 points and earned first-team All-OVC, OVC All-Tournament Team and third-team All-Great Lakes Region honors for her performance.

LeMaster, who is the first Panther to be named All-OVC four times, currently ranks fourth on the EIU career charts in goals (22), gamewinning goals (6), assists (22) and points (66).

LeMaster recently completed her NSCAA national diploma and is a member of the Maryland DDP coaching staff. A native of Collinsville, Ill., she earned her bachelor's degree in physical education from Eastern Illinois in 2003 and is pursuing her master's degree in education at Frostburg State.



Sarah Daw Assistant Coach

Sarah Daw enters her second season on the Frostburg State women's soccer staff as the team's goalkeeper coach after a standout career at Division II Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

Daw, who has spent the last two summers

on the coaching staff of Tony DiCicco's SoccerPlus Goalkeeper Camp, played four years at IUP.

As a senior, she earned first-team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference honors after posting a 0.87 goals against average (the third-lowest mark in school history) and leading the Indians to a 19-4 finish well as their first PSAC title since 1995. IUP set a school record for wins in a season, earned its first-ever bid to the NCAA Tournament and finished 21st in the final NSCAA/adidas Division II national rankings.

Daw finished her career with a school-record 360 saves, and her 0.95 goals against average ranks second all-time at IUP.

Daw, who is from New Freedom, Pa., earned her bachelor's degree in sports administration and a minor in business from IUP. She is currently pursuing a master's degree in business administration.



BOBCATS LOOKING FOR SIXTH STRAIGHT AMCC TITLE, NCAA TOURNEY BID

espite having only one senior and 13 freshmen heading into the 2006 season, the Frostburg State women's soccer team has been selected by the league's coaches as the favorite to win the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference. The Bobcats are aiming for their sixth-straight title and NCAA Tournament appearance.

"This certainly is a transition year for us after graduating 12 four-year players over the last two seasons," said head coach Brian Parker. "This is the most freshmen we have had on any of our teams in my five years at Frostburg State."

However, the Bobcats have 11 returners, led by AMCC Preseason Player of the Year Jen Naylor (Riva, Md./St. Mary's). The junior co-captain will lead the midfield this season after finishing second on the team a year ago with seven goals and 16 points. She is a two-time All-AMCC performer and has started in all but one game during her career as a Bobcat.

Junior Anita Wickerham (Morgantown, Pa./Twin Valley), sophomore Tricia Richardson (Gibson Island, Md./St. Mary's) and freshman Lauren Lentine (Princeton, N.J./WWP North) will battle for an outside midfield position.

Wickerham played in 20 games last fall and netted three goals while Richardson appeared in 18 contests with three goals and two assists. Lentine is the most fit new player on the team and has the ability to play forward as well.

Freshmen Kiley Williams (Millersville, Md./Severna Park) has emerged as the likely starter at the other center midfielder position next to Naylor. Williams has great pace and a good first touch.

Freshman Kelly Sanzone (Jarrettsville, Md./North Harford) will battle for time in the midfield as well as junior transfer Katie Owings (Gambrills, Md./South River) and freshmen Christine Fitzgerald (Gaithersburg, Md./Gaithersburg) and Kendal Moss (Hagerstown, Md./Williamsport).

Senior Lindsay Hoffman (Frederick, Md./Thomas Johnson) returns as the teams top forward. She was second in scoring on the Bobcats a year ago with 17 points, six goals and five assists.

The other frontline spot will see a host of players competing for time. Freshmen Amanda Drake (Montgomery Village, Md./Watkins Mill) and Lentine have emerged as the top candidates while sophomore Ali Keeney (Smithsburg, Md./Middletown) and freshman Kaleigh Herring (Perry Hall, Md./North Harford) will battle for time as well.

Keeney scored one goal and added one assist a year ago and could possibly see time in the midfield this fall.

The defense will be anchored by sophomore **Tori Walter** (Frederick, Md./Frederick). She started all 20 games a season ago scoring one goal and adding one assist.

Freshman Katie Emminger (Baltimore, Md./Perry Hall) is a tall, intelligent player who has earned the starting spot in the middle with Walter.

Sophomore Jackie Donovan (Hollidaysburg, Pa./Hollidaysburg

Area) has remained as the fastest player on the team and she returns
to the backline where she started every game last fall.

The other back position is up for grabs as junior Sarah Huber (Walkersville, Md./Walkersville) and freshman Morggan McGill (Hagerstown, Md./Williamsport) battle for time with freshmen Liz Neroni (Westlake, Ohio/St. Joseph's Academy), Amber Roehling (Ashburn, Va./Broad Run) and Melody Pereira (Montgomery Village, Md./Watkins Mill).

In net, junior Molly Whyte (Basking Ridge, N.J./Ridge) started every game a year ago and earned second-team All-AMCC honors. She will be competing with freshman Stephanie Gwinn (Ijamsville, Md./Urbana) for the starting job along with sophomore Amanda Banaszak (Warrenton, Va./Faquier).

The schedule is always tough for the Bobcats and 2006 won't be any different. FSU faces preseason nationally ranked Johns Hopkins, who defeated FSU 1-0 last season.

Frostburg State's non-conference schedule is Catholic, Allegheny, Richard Stockton and Eastern Mennonite. Last fall, Catholic captured the Capital Athletic Conference title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament

The Bobcats begin AMCC action on Sept. 23 when they travel to face Lake Erie. FSU will be challenged by rival Penn State Behrend and La Roche, who were picked to finish second and third in the preseason poll.

"We like the way our team is coming together but we certainly have a lot of work to do," added Parker. "Our challenge is to keep working and getting better every week and I think these players understand that and are excited about the season."








TRAVEL/FACILITIES
